Tom Yoder Neufeld has been a chaplain, pastor, Bible teacher, and public speaker for almost five decades. He and his wife, Rebecca, live in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada, where they are engaged in the life of their congregation, First Mennonite Church, in Kitchener, Ontario.

Tom has served the larger church in many ways, currently as chair of MWC’s Faith and Life Commission. His speaking and teaching have taken him across North America, as well as to Europe, Asia, and Africa.

Tom’s best known scholarly work is his commentary on Ephesians (BCBC, 2002), *Recovering Jesus: The Witness of the New Testament* (2007), and *Killing Enmity: Violence and the New Testament* (2011). His passion has been to have his scholarship serve the church in its life and witness.

Tom and Rebecca have two children: David, an Anabaptist historian, married to Gina Martinez of Bogota, Colombia, and Miriam, a surgeon in Boston. Tom loves singing and painting and leading tours exploring the world of Paul in Turkey, Greece, and Italy.
